

# BUDGET

## What is a City Budget?

A budget is the amount of money a city needs to serve the community. While it's a financial document that appropriates funds, its also a plan for the future that informs decisions for the good of the community.

Our annual budget reflects the community's priorities. Each year, City staff work to prepare a budget that aligns with the City Council's vision, values and strategic priorities. The City adopts the annual budget by a resolution which sets forth the total revenues and expenditures approved for each fund.

In Burnsville, the budget has two main components—a **capital budget** (funding tangible things like streets, parks, buildings, vehicles and equipment) and an **operating budget** (providing the support needed to serve the community). Funding for these budgets comes from a variety of sources including property taxes, special assessments, franchise fees, utility fees and state, federal and local grant funding.

### What is a Tax Levy?

Property taxes are the largest source of revenue for the City. The budget determines the City's property tax levy needs. One of the key components of yearly budget planning is establishing a proposed or maximum property tax levy, the maximum amount the City can levy for the year. The City receives approximately one third of your annual property tax bill. Your school district, county and other agencies receive the rest.

On September 16, the Burnsville City Council adopted a maximum property tax levy of \$58,411,623 for the 2026 budget, an increase of 7.4% from 2025. For the average homeowner, the proposed levy equates to an increase in the City portion of property taxes of approximately \$8/m onth.



Council meeting starts at 5:30 p.m., prior to budget discussion, in the Council Chambers, 100 Civic Center Parkway. 
#### **General Fund**

The General Fund supports basic government services for the City and is primarily funded by property taxes. This includes police, fire and Emergency Medical Services (EMS), as well as parks, public works, community development and administration. This is the foundation for the City's annual operational budget that allows the City to provide everyday essentials (clean water, safe roads and flushing to sewers) and focus on safety and community connections.

# **Nicollet Business Campus & Garden of Eden Cemetery Stormwater Resiliency**

Along Highway 13, near the Nicollet Business Campus and the Garden of Eden Cemetery, the City is constructing a regional stormwater basin as part of its ongoing stormwater resiliency efforts. Now substantially complete, this project is designed to reduce flooding and improve water quality in one of the City's most impervious areas.

The project was identified in the City's 2019-2020 Stormwater Resiliency Study, which modeled future rainfall scenarios to pinpoint areas most at risk from heavy rain events under changing climate conditions. Supported by a \$750,000 MPCA Stormwater Resiliency Grant, the basin will capture and redirect runoff from over 80 acres of industrial, commercial and residential land along Highway 13. Once complete, it will help control stormwater flow rates, protect downstream infrastructure and remove sediment to enhance water quality.

Construction is on track for substantial completion later this fall, delivering long-term flood protection and cleaner waterways to the Highway 13 corridor.

### **Tracking Lake Health**

Eight Burnsville lakes are monitored through the Community Assisted Monitoring Program (CAMP), administered by the Metropolitan Council. CAMP volunteers visit the same lake every two weeks from April through October to measure and record water clarity. Water samples are collected and then submitted to the Metropolitan Council for testing.

Water clarity is a measurement of how deep sunlight penetrates into the lake. This is influenced by the density of floating material (like algae). When nutrients such as phosphorus are at high levels, the density of the tiny algae increases, which in turn reduces water clarity.

Water clarity affects aquatic plant growth, oxygen levels in the water and water temperature. These factors are important for lake health. For example, poor clarity means less light and reduced photosynthesis by aquatic plants, leading to lower oxygen for fish and aquatic life.

This table includes data gathered by CAMP volunteers. Each number shows how deep the Secchi disk (water clarity



measurement tool pictured) was visible when lowered into the water. The three-year averages show that most monitored lakes in Burnsville are at or near their goals. These results and other lake data guide the City's decisions about surface water quality projects.



### **Protecting Water Quality on** Keller Lake

In 2017, thanks to a Minnesota Clean Water Fund grant, the City installed an underground system at Crystal Beach Park to help keep Keller Lake clean. This system captures stormwater runoff from the Keller Lake watershed and traps sediment and phosphorus before they can flow into the lake, helping prevent algae blooms and keeping the water healthier for everyone to enjoy.

Like any hardworking piece of equipment, it needs a little TLC now and then. In 2024, it was time for a clean-out. Crews removed an impressive 330 cubic yards of sediment and muck—that's enough to fill more than 30 dump trucks! All of that material would have otherwise ended up in Keller Lake, so this cleanup was a big win for water quality.





### **COLONIAL WATER TOWER GETS A MAKEOVER!**

One of Burnsville's important landmarks is getting some TLC. Built in 1962, the Colonial Water Tower has been serving up clean, safe drinking water for more than 60 years. Now it's time for a refresh!

The tower will be getting a brand-new coating, structural upgrades and safety improvements to keep it in tip-top shape for decades to come. Work kicks off this September with exterior updates, and next spring, the tower will step out of service for its "spa treatment" of blasting, painting and interior improvements. Everything is expected to wrap up by June 2026 when the Colonial Water Tower will be ready to keep the water flowing for our community.

# Make sure you're ready for colder temperatures

Looking to make efficiency improvements before the first frost? Whether you are a homeowner, renter, multi-family property owner, or local business, our Sustainability Dashboard can help you save energy and money all season long.



Insulate and seal gaps to keep heat in: Poor insulation and leaky homes are some of the biggest sources of heat loss in homes. You might not see the gaps, but your energy bill will feel them. By insulating attics, basements and walls, and sealing gaps with caulk or foam, you can prevent warm air from escaping and reduce your heating bills. Even window film and thermal curtains can make a difference. Be sure all windows and storm windows are completely closed all winter. Not sure how to assess your insulation? Check out the Home Energy Squad®!

Home Energy Squad®\* offers in-home visits with experts to assess your home's efficiency! They look



at your home's insulation; install efficiency equipment such as weather stripping, low flow faucets and showerheads; and help you understand rebates and incentives for recommended projects. Install a smart thermostat: Smart thermostats help you save energy by automatically adjusting temperatures based on your schedule. In winter, lowering your thermostat by 7–10 °F for eight hours a day can cut heating and cooling costs by up to 10% annually. Some utilities offer a free or reduced cost smart or programmable thermostat, so be sure to check with your utility provider.

Reverse ceiling fans: Ceiling fans are not just for summer! During the winter, switch your ceiling fan's direction to clockwise and run it at a low speed. This helps push warm air, which naturally rises, back down into the living space, making rooms feel warmer and more comfortable without raising the thermostat.

Tune up your furnace: Get an annual furnace tune-up and be sure you are up to date on installing a new furnace filter. Plus, make sure that all registers in your home are clear of furniture or other items to help with proper air flow through the house.

Consider renewable energy: While you are upgrading your home for winter, consider going one step


further. Burnsville's electric utilities also offer renewable energy programs. These programs let you source your electricity from wind or solar energy, without installing any equipment. There is typically a small monthly cost, but it is an easy way to reduce your carbon footprint year-round. Learn more on the Sustainability Dashboard.

# **Prepare Your Mailbox for Winter**

If you've got a mailbox mounted on a post by the street, take a moment to give it a good shake this fall! It might sound funny, but it's an easy way to make sure that your mailbox setup is stable enough to withstand winter storms and snow plowing ahead.

In the winter, unstable mailboxes can easily be toppled by the force of the snow when a plow passes. Even though plows typically travel around 20 miles per hour while plowing, mailboxes in poor condition may not survive the snow pushed by the plow.

Checking that your mailbox is stable includes shaking it to see if it's wobbly or if the post is rotting. Additionally, double check that screws or other fasteners are tight and in good condition. Doing this in the fall gives you enough time to replace anything that is damaged or aged, and

avoids the inconvenience of frozen ground, missed mail or other delays in the winter.

## **USPS** mailbox location standards

Mailbox location must follow the guidelines of the U.S. Postal Service and the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) standards in the Roadside Design Guide. Your mailbox should be 41" to 45" from the road surface to the bottom of the mailbox or point of mail entry, and 6" to 8" back from the curb or edge of the pavement (see above). 30 years, or upon sale/transfer of the property.



#### **Eligible Borrowers**

At least one borrower must be at least 65 years of age. All borrowers must be legal residents of the United States as evidenced by a social security number.

# HOME MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

#### **ALL LOANS**

The Center for Energy and Environment (CEE) is the lender for these programs and can assist homeowners with the loan process.



#### **Income Limit**

Prioritized for low-income households and families, Call CEE at 612-335-5884 to determine if you qualify.



#### **Eligible Properties**

1-4-unit owner occupied properties located in Burnsville. Townhomes and Condominiums are eligible. The property must be homesteaded or in the process of being homesteaded.



#### **Ineligible Properties**

Cooperatives, manufactured homes and properties with more than four units, under construction, held in a Trust or by a Contract for Deed or used for commercial purposes.



#### **Eligible Use of Funds**

Most permanent interior and exterior improvements, maintenance or remodeling. Improvements are determined by a CEE representative's analysis of the property.



#### **Ineligible Use of Funds**

Common area improvements (Homeowner Associations), payment for work initiated prior to the loan being approved and closed, unless due to emergency. Recreation or luxury projects, non-permanent appliances (unless part of a kitchen remodel) and funds for homeowner labor.

#### **CODE CASH**

The Code Cash Home Improvement Grant is available to qualified residents to help remedy minor property code violations. Call our Neighborhood Services team at 952-895-4431.



#### **Grant Amount**

Up to \$2,000



#### **Eligible Recipients**





# Burnsville Police Department Launches Blue Envelope Program

In July, the Burnsville Police Department began using the Blue Envelope Program—a communication tool designed to help individuals with autism and other disabilities during interactions with law enforcement.

The program allows individuals to share important information with officers during a traffic stop or other encounter. The blue envelope can hold items like a driver's license, registration, insurance card and emergency contacts, along with details about the person's disability (e.g., sensitivity to lights or sounds) and tips for effective communication.

By presenting the blue envelope, individuals can help officers better understand their needs, reduce stress and create a more positive and safe experience.

LITHIUM-ION BATTERIES store a lot of energy in a small place. These batteries can overheat, start a fire, or explode if overcharged or damaged. By learning how to **BUY**, **CHARGE**, and **RECYCLE** these batteries safely, you can help prevent a fire in your home.



**BUY** only listed products. When buying a product that uses a lithium-ion battery look for a safety certification mark such as UL, ETL, or CSA. This means it meets important safety standards.



**STOP** using your device right away if the battery smells weird, gets too hot, makes popping noises, changes in shape or color. If it is safe, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call **9-1-1**.



**CHARGE** devices safely. Always use the cables that came with the product to charge. Follow the instructions from the manufacturer. Buy new chargers from the manufacturer or one that the manufacturer has approved.



**RECYCLE** batteries responsibly. Don't throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular recycling bins because they could start a fire.



**CHARGE** your device on a hard surface. Don't overcharge your device. Unplug it or remove the battery when it's fully charged.



**RECYCLE** your device or battery at a safe battery recycling location. Visit **call2recycle.org** to find a recycling spot near you.





# Stay Informed with **Dakota911 Emergency Alerts**

Have you signed up for Dakota911 emergency alerts? Dakota911, our countywide dispatch agency, provides notifications to keep residents informed and safe. Alerts range from warnings about dangerous situations to requests for help locating endangered individuals.

#### TYPES OF ALERTS

Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA): Geo-targeted messages sent automatically to cell phones in an impacted area no registration required. You may have received these for major weather events.

**Public Safety Notifications:** Opt-in alerts about public safety activities in your area. Sign up at dakota911mn.gov to subscribe.

# **Growing Together:** Burnsville's Market Garden

Tucked away in Burnsville is a little patch of land that's been doing big things. Since 2021, a former ice rink and warming house is now home to the Market Garden and has grown into more than just rows of veggies—it's become a place where youth learn job skills, families receive fresh food and the whole community benefits.

The garden started with Grow Burnsville, a program kicked off by a \$125,000 national grant. The idea was simple: provide better access to fresh, healthy food and create hands-on opportunities for young people. Fast-forward a few years, and the garden has produced more than 15,000 pounds of food, which have been donated to our local partner, 360 Communities and even drawn in a few unexpected visitors—like the bald eagle that now calls it part of its hunting grounds.

"We get to work with beautiful plants and animals, and every day is different," says Market Garden Supervisor Paige Hawkins. "The best part is knowing we're all working together for the community. It feels like a team effort."



Over the years, the garden has kept evolving. A dripline irrigation system has provided heightened efficiency and helps conserve water, clover planted between rows makes it easier to walk, provides homes for pollinators, soaks up excess rainwater (and removes prime mosquito habitats), native flowers now bring in pollinators and brighten up the block. Even the little things—like compostable tomato clips and twine—show the garden's commitment to sustainability.

This past summer, 16 youth interns rolled up their sleeves alongside Paige. They planted, weeded, harvested and earned an income while learning what it takes to grow food sustainably. And the results are delicious—everything from watermelon and cucumbers to collard greens, okra, basil and butternut squash. Paige chooses crops with different cuisines in mind and often plants based on what neighbors say they'd like to see.



# **Harvest Handouts:** New in 2025

This year, Paige and the team rolled out Harvest Handouts. From August to mid-October, the community had the opportunity to stop by the Market Garden on Wednesdays, Thursdays or Fridays to pick up fresh produce—completely free. Residents let the garden crew know what they were looking for and the team harvested it for them on the spot.

Everything is packed in compostable bags and since the garden shares space with Dakota County's organics recycling drop-off, it's easy to keep the loop sustainable from start to finish.

Next time you're in the neighborhood, walk, roll or drive by and see what's buzzing in the garden—you might even spot that eagle while you're there.
