

Founded in 1858 and officially incorporated in 1964, Burnsville, Minnesota, is nestled on a scenic bluff overlooking the south bank of the Minnesota River, just upstream from its confluence with the Mississippi River. Burnsville has grown into a flourishing suburb in the Twin Cities metro area, offering commuters easy access to both Minneapolis and Saint Paul and a welcoming and connected community to call home. With an estimated population of 65,000 residents and home to over 2,500 businesses, Burnsville is a thriving community that provides a wide range of services and experiences to benefit its residents, thousands of annual visitors and hundreds of city employees.

Burnsville boasts a wealth of recreational and cultural attractions, including Murphy-Hanrehan Park Reserve, Buck Hill and a portion of the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge. Burnsville's downtown, known as the Heart of the City, features vibrant urban-style retail spaces and modern condominiums, providing a lively area for both residents and visitors. The Heart of the City is home to the Ames Performing Arts Center, a center for creativity and entertainment. Plus, the Burnsville Transit Station serves as a central hub for the Minnesota Valley Transit Authority, offering convenient transportation options around the city and beyond.

Above all, Burnsville is a community where people feel safe, valued and connected. It's a place where residents enjoy a strong sense of belonging, businesses thrive and visitors return time and time again.

Burnsville's Community Focus

In Burnsville, residents elect a Mayor and four City Councilmembers, each with equal voting authority, to make key policy and legislative decisions that reflect the community's best interest – much like a board of directors. These decisions are then implemented by the city staff, under the direction of the City Manager, who functions as the chief executive officer.

This system, known as a Statutory B city, is designed to efficiently translate community needs into tangible outcomes.

Collaboration is at the heart of Burnsville's governance, with everyone working together to best serve the City's residents. The City Council's six strategic priorities – safety, community engagement, organizational culture, community vibrancy, infrastructure and sustainability – serve as the guiding framework of the shared vision of a vibrant city, boldly leading and welcoming to all.

When does the City Council meet?

The public is welcome to attend City Council meetings, work sessions, and public hearings, either in-person or virtually. Meetings are held in the Council Chambers at Burnsville City Hall, located at 100 Civic Center Parkway.

For those unable to attend in person, meetings can be streamed live or watched on-demand online at <u>burnsvillemn.gov/meetings</u> or on Burnsville Civic Channel 16 and HD Channel 859 for cable subscribers.

How can I stay informed about meetings or share a comment?

Meeting agendas are shared in advance and can be found in the City Hall lobby, emailed to subscribers and accessed online at <u>burnsvillemn.gov/meetings</u>.

Some agenda items may include a Public Hearing, allowing individuals the opportunity to provide input on specific issues. The Council also provides a Citizens' Comments section, where members of the public can speak on topics not currently on the agenda or in the application process. This segment is scheduled for ten minutes, with no action taken during this time.

If an item generates significant public interest, the Council may choose to review and study it in greater detail before deciding on any action.



Burnsville Fire

Burnsville is one of the few cities in the state that operates an all-career staffed fire department with ambulance service, providing you with faster response and quality care for medical emergencies.

Burnsville is home to two fire stations, strategically located to provide quick response times. They are staffed 24/7 by a professional, full-time crew of 53 firefighters/paramedics and two civilian staff. The department is committed to the preservation of life, safety and protection of property. Burnsville believes in engaging the community as partners in fire prevention, emergency preparedness and injury prevention.

What You Need to Know

Bonfire Safety

- · A free, annual recreational fire permit is required
- Prior to starting the fire, call the recreational burning hotline at 952-895-4666 to ensure it is safe to burn in current weather conditions
- Fire must be contained within a non-combustible fire ring
- Fire must be at least 25 feet from structures and fencing, and 15 feet from property line
- Fire must be extinguished by 11 p.m.
- Only firewood can be burned; no leaves, yard waste, trash, combustibles or construction materials and no painted or treated lumber
- Water must be at the ready
- · A responsible adult must be present until fully extinguished

Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detectors

Smoke alarms need to be installed in every sleeping area/bedroom and on every level of your home. Carbon monoxide detectors need to be installed on every floor of the home and within ten feet of sleeping areas/bedrooms.


Volunteer with Our Public Safety Teams

Burnsville's Mobile Volunteer Network (MVN) teams up with our Police and Fire personnel during special events, disaster response and emergency situations. We provide training in crowd/traffic control, first aid, search and rescue and emergency coordination. Volunteers also have the opportunity to participate in other specialized trainings.

MVN volunteers are asked to serve approximately 20 hours each year, including two-to-four trainings and at least two events.

See Something, Say Something

In Dakota County, 9-1-1 is used for both emergency and non-emergency police, fire and medical response. Dispatchers will route callers to the appropriate contact.

Calling 9-1-1 does not interrupt emergency response or distract from urgent calls. It is structured to handle all types of public safety concerns. We encourage you to call 9-1-1 anytime you feel unsafe or suspicious of activity you are witnessing or when reporting police-related situations such as abandoned cars, parking violations, lost or found property, non-injury accidents, vandalism and noise complaints.

Night to Unite

Each year, neighborhoods, City staff and City leaders gather to build community partnerships during Night to Unite. This is a great opportunity to get to know your neighbors, heighten crime prevention awareness and strengthen neighborhood spirit. This annual event is held on the first Tuesday of August. Burnsville City Academy

This nine-week, in-depth program gives residents an inside look into Police operations, including an overview of fire/EMS training and City services. Participants are given the opportunity to tour facilities, experience hands-on activities such as dusting for prints, learn about common police calls, ask experts questions, learn about department functions, see traffic stops, watch demonstrations and get involved in various scenarios. Getting Around

Located with convenient access to major roads including I-35E, I-35W and County Road 42, Burnsville offers the best of both worlds – a welcoming suburban atmosphere with an easy commute across the Twin Cities. Burnsville offers two public transportation options: Minnesota Valley Transit Association (MVTA) and Metro Transit. Bike lanes and hiking/biking trails are abundant throughout the city.

No Overnight Street Parking

Vehicles parked on the street overnight pose public safety hazards and obstruct public service vehicles like ambulances and snow plows. On-street parking in Burnsville is not allowed between 2 to 6 a.m., year-round. Temporary permits may be requested online at <u>burnsvillemn.gov/parking</u>.

Street Improvements

Street and utility construction projects are prioritized based on age and condition of roadways – as well as replacement schedules for underground utilities.

Metro Transit Orange Line

Metro Transit, <u>metrotransit.org</u>, offers a network of bus-rapid transit (BRT), light-rail transit (LRT) and regional routes throughout the Twin Cities. One of the newest and most convenient options for commuters is the Orange Line, a bus rapid transit service with stops in Burnsville, Bloomington, Richfield and downtown Minneapolis.

Minnesota Valley Transit Authority (MVTA)

MVTA, <u>mvta.com</u>, offers express, local bus service to south suburban cities including Apple Valley, Burnsville, Eagan, Rosemount, Savage and Prior Lake. They also offer MVTA Connect, an on-demand, ride-share service in Apple Valley, Burnsville, Savage and Rosemount to a transit center for connections to other MVTA services.

Park & Ride Locations

- Burnsville Transit Station 100 East Highway 13 features 1,300 parking spaces, indoor climate-controlled waiting area and bus pass sales.
- Heart of the City Park and Ride 126th Street and Pillsbury Avenue features 370 parking spaces and an indoor climate-controlled waiting area.

Homeowner Resources

Is it time to do a little work on your home? The City of Burnsville, Dakota County and community partners offer a variety of resources, financial assistance, education and services for homeowners. Whether you are a long-time resident planning home renovations or brand new to our community, we invite you to come and connect.

Homeowner Workshops

Each spring and fall, the City of Burnsville hosts free workshops with tips, tricks and information to help you get started with home improvement projects.

Whether you are tackling do-it-yourself projects or plan to hire a contractor, these workshops cover topics such as home remodels, basement finishes, window replacements, insulation, permit requirements and basic plumbing, electrical, HVAC and building codes.

Home Improvement Loans

Burnsville residents benefit from low rates and flexible terms with direct loans for housing maintenance and repairs. These loans can be used for most interior and exterior improvements, maintenance or remodeling. For those ages 65 and older, Burnsville also offers a deferred loan option for home improvements, as funds are available.

The City and its partners have additional options for fixing property code violations, weather and energy improvements and foreclosure prevention.

Renting and Rental Licensing

Are you considering renting out your home or property in Burnsville? The City requires that all rental property owners be licensed as a rental business to ensure owners are meeting the quality of life needs of their tenants and neighboring residents. Common Questions & Tips



Address Numbers on Houses

Help fire, police and paramedics find your home during an emergency. Address numbers on the front of homes should be at least four inches high and a color that stands out to be seen day and night.

Lawn Care and Watering

- Lawn/grass height should be no greater than eight inches
- Water restrictions are in place April 1-Sept. 30:
 - Watering is not allowed between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. on any day
 - Homes with odd-numbered addresses may water lawns in the morning or evening on odd-numbered calendar dates
 - Homes with even-numbered addresses may water lawns in the morning or evening on even-numbered calendar dates
 - o If there are 31 days in a month, both even and odd addresses may water on the 31st

Exceptions to these restrictions include hand watering, new seed/sod and plants that require daily watering. Residents with newly-seeded lawns or new sod should contact the City's Public Works Department at 952-895-4550 to be placed on a 20-day exemption list.

Property Maintenance

We all value the safety and beauty of our community. It takes all of us to be good neighbors by maintaining our homes and yards.

Common issues include:

- Improperly parked vehicles and trailers, including on lawns
- · Inoperable or unlicensed motor vehicles
- Broken windows or doors
- · Poorly maintained home exteriors, roofs, sheds and fences
- · Peeling paint and siding
- Excessive or overflowing trash and rubbish
- Dead or dying trees and vegetation
- Inoperable smoke and carbon monoxide alarms

Do I need a building permit?

You need a permit for many home projects including electrical, plumbing and HVAC work, window, door, roof or siding replacements and most new construction projects or when a structure is built, enlarged, altered, repaired, moved, converted or demolished. This ensures your project meets minimum construction and safety standards. Most permit applications are available online at burnsvillemn.gov/permit.

Garbage, Recycling & More

Garbage and Recycling

Burnsville licenses several private companies to collect garbage and recycling for residents. Residents can choose from a list of licensed haulers at burnsvillemn.gov/waste.

The Recycling Zone

The Recycling Zone is a place for residents to get rid of items they can't throw in the trash – including fluorescent light bulbs, paint, electronics and other household hazardous waste. The Recycling Zone is located at 3365 Dodd Road, Eagan, or 952-891-7800.

Dakota Valley Recycling

The City's recycling department is shared between the cities of Burnsville, Apple Valley, Eagan and Lakeville – and goes by the name Dakota Valley Recycling.

Dakota Valley Recycling is a great resource for tips to reduce, reuse and recycle, and for options such as organics collection. They also host a number of events throughout the year, including:

Market Garden

Located at 260 Civic Center Parkway, the Market Garden is uniquely Burnsville and provides education and internship opportunities for youth and donates the harvest to local food shelves.



Food Forest
